

In the changing economy, JAM, Inc. has begun to rely less on decreased government grant funding and more on those who support traditional music education for youth. We are thankful every day for our generous donors who make JAM's existence possible! As you may know, JAM employs only one full-time director and a very part-time bookkeeper. The Board of Directors oversees the organization's commitment to its mission and also assists with planning and coordination of events as needed. The director's time is split according to duties, and thankfully, the majority of hours worked are dedicated to providing program services. All services are provided to communities and affiliates for free, including the outreach, assistance and training associated with the development of new programs, as well as the ongoing consultation, assistance and provision of materials and supplies to existing JAM affiliates.



In May, JAM partnered with the Blue Ridge Parkway Foundation to host a regional day camp for kids at the Blue Ridge Music Center in Galax, VA. More than 60 kids participated in workshops led by master old time and bluegrass musicians. The students were able to meet and jam with each other for the first time, making connections reaching from the coalfields of Virginia to the mountains of Western North Carolina. Five of the programs chose to perform for the public that evening. Thanks to our funders, we were able to offer the camp at no charge!

- ★ Hosted two regional professional development/training workshops for over 50 JAM instructors & directors
- ★ Aided in developing 10 new JAM programs in VA, NC, and TN
- ★ Loaned nearly 75 instruments to programs in need

- Distributed instructional materials, administrative guides and accessories for kids such as strings, picks and capos
